LESSON INTRODUCTION

Lesson Target • Lesson Setting • Teacher Helps

Lesson Introduction sections are fantastic tools for teachers to engage students with a deeper understanding of scripture. They begin each two-unit section by providing teachers with the lesson target, lesson setting, and critical background information that will translate into students understanding the context and application of the Core Bible Stories.

LESSON CONNECTION

Core Bible Story and Unit Bible Passage

Lesson Connection pages quickly identify the crux of each unit's learning objective: how the Core Bible Story and Unit Bible Passage combine to help students accomplish the lesson target.



ONLINE HIGHLIGHTS

Online Highlights feature 15 key points that students are learning in their online adventure. These points can be used to facilitate discussion, prompt writing, or enhance personal application.

TEACHER ENRICHMENT

In addition to the lesson introduction and connection pages in this TE, it is imperative that teachers go to the online adventure site on a per unit basis and click the "Teachers/Enrichment" tab. Here, teachers are given invaluable meaning behind each unit's Bible Passage with insight into how the unit's Bible Passage fits into the overall semester theme. This teacher enrichment devotional unit is placed online because of the value we place on extending the learning into the home and giving parents tools to further instruct their children.

DAY 1

Each Core Bible Story is studied over a two-unit period and is either repeated, or divided and continued in the 2nd unit, depending on the size of the story. This two-unit discussion format allows for students to fully understand and apply each Core Bible Story and the multiple Bible Passages that further its meaning and application. We want students to not just know, but understand and apply God's Word.

This is a teacher-led activity that requires preparation from the "Lesson Introduction" and "Lesson Connection" sections. This is not an activity students should accomplish without a teacher. The Core Bible Story discussion is optimally taught in this order:

- Class reads entire story
- Teacher inserts background for understanding
- Class re-reads a highlighted verse section with questions (4 sections)
- Teacher facilitates answering questions from highlighted verse section
- Teacher provides insight, personal story or application

ODD UNITS: DAY 1 Core Bible Story Discussion

The Core Bible Story discussion section starts off each two-week unit. Therefore, it is best for teachers to facilitate discussion, solicit input from students, and guide students so that there is complete accuracy and understanding of the Core Bible Story.

EVEN UNITS: DAY 1 Core Bible Story Application

To follow up the even-unit Core Bible Story discussion, this activity allows students to express what they've learned. This activity works best when students are allowed to self-reflect and write out their thoughts, followed by classroom discussion so that students can learn from the application of fellow students.

THIS UNIT'S LYRICS

This page was designed to allow students to take advantage of how the song lyrics expose the spiritual challenge of the unit's Bible Passage. The uniqueness of the Bible REPLAY Curriculum[™] is that it allows students to explore the connection between the unit's Bible Passage and the song it inspired, which was specifically designed with lyrical hooks and relatable language to bring the meaning of the Bible Passage alive in kids' hearts and minds. With each lyrics page, teachers have the opportunity to discuss the unit's Bible Passage, converse with students about how the song reflects the key scripture, and let students make notes about what they're learning. Catchy tunes emphasize lifetime messages!

What WE LEARNED Learning Points • Unit Quiz

The learning points and unit quiz pages allow teachers to review key points with students and assess knowledge. In addition to the 30 quiz questions students encounter in your classroom online adventure, the 5 learning points and 7 quiz questions in the student workbooks prompt further discussion of both the Core Bible Story and the unit's Bible Passage.

EVEN UNITS: DAY 2

Scripture Study

Students have an opportunity to locate and study scriptures in their Bibles that further teach the meaning of the unit's Bible Passage. Students will see how different parts of the Bible are related and how the main idea applies to their lives. As time allows, students may explore up to 3 supplemental Bible Passages in this activity.

CREATIVE PAGE

Student Workbooks (SW) only. This page includes extra workspace for activities that may have been assigned anytime within a two-unit section. This activity workspace may precede or follow the activity assignment, so helpful page markers are in place to guide students to the activity and back to their lesson page.

ADVENTURE WRAP-UP

Students conclude every two-unit section with the adventure wrap-up page to use for journaling, reflection and application. Class discussion can follow this reflection for students willing to share their thoughts.

TIPS FOR BIBLE MEMORY VERSES ("BMVs")

• Key Bible Passages that are considered foundational for memory are indicated in the Teacher's Edition with the memory verse symbol to assist in lesson planning. We recognize that schools have individual approaches to scripture memorization. While some memorize Bible

Passages weekly, others focus on key foundational scriptures that are more frequently memorized. To accommodate every learning approach, unit Bible Passages feature a BLUE section that indicates the portion to be assigned as a "BMV" for the unit, which is especially helpful when the unit Bible Passage is considered too long for memorization.

- To memorize scripture, students must first understand the meaning. For every Bible Passage, it is essential to first define terms and discuss the meaning of the passage with your class before memorization is assigned.
- There are four Bible memory activities designed to engage students and facilitate memorization. The activities are:
 - Word Sequence Race
- Scripture Scrambler
- Memory Verse Game
- Team Silence

For each selected Bible Memory Verse, one of the four memory activities is suggested. Instructions for these activities are found in the blue boxes of your Teacher's Edition. Although activities are recommended for each memory verse, they can be used with other verses.



USE THE ONLINE "WORD BUNDLERS" IN CLASS AS A MEMORIZATION TOOL!

Online, the "Word Bundlers" (the 2nd online video adventure each unit) are designed using current research strategies to help students easily decipher and memorize verses. The main idea and key points are also provided to help students understand the Bible Passage. We encourage classroom use of these videos in addition to home use as an extremely useful tool to assist and support students in scripture understanding and memorization.

LESSON INTRODUCTION



Mark 1:40–45

Background

Lesson Target

Know God's mission for Jesus: the mission to bring people to God's kingdom. That's our mission too.

Lesson Setting

Mark is a "busy" Gospel. Jesus is busy meeting needs and being God's Messiah. Mark focuses more on Jesus' deeds than His discourse. Mark also emphasizes Jesus as God's servant. Interestingly, the genealogy of a servant is meaningless; thus, the Gospel of Mark does not contain the genealogy of Jesus.

In this Core Bible Story, a leper came to Jesus, pleading for healing. While lepers suffered greatly physically, they also suffered emotionally because they had to live outside cities, avoid contact with people, and announce that they were unclean if anyone approached. They couldn't participate in religious or social activities. Leprosy caused head-to-toe sores; hair loss; rotting nails and joints; gum shrinkage; and tooth loss. People called them the living dead! It's no surprise that the man is so desperate that he breaks the law and kneels before Jesus, imploring Him for healing. The leper demonstrates great faith because, as far as we can tell, Jesus had not healed anyone of leprosy before.

People believed that only God could heal a leper, so this act not only showed Jesus to be the Messiah from God, it even gave evidence He was God.

LESSON CONNECTION

Unit 1

Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

This Unit's Connection

In the Core Bible Story, Jesus shows He has the power to heal leprosy. Leprosy made people ceremonially unclean so they could not approach the temple or other people. Likewise, sin makes us unclean so that we cannot approach heaven or God. But Jesus cleansed the man of leprosy, demonstrating He had the power to cleanse all people of uncleanness. Indeed, He can cleanse us not just of physical uncleanness but also of spiritual uncleanness.

Jesus rescued the leper from the dominion of a debilitating physical disease, but He offers something even greater. Colossians 1:13 tells us that God "rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." Colossians tells us more about how that can be so. It says that Jesus "is the image of the invisible God"! He is God made visible to people. Not only that, but all things in heaven and earth "were created by him and for him" and He "is before all things, and in him all things hold together" (Colossians 1:16b–17).

That's why Jesus could reach out and touch the leper. Leprosy could not infect Jesus; rather, Jesus cleaned the leprosy. Our sin cannot infect Jesus; instead, He presents us "without blemish and free from accusation" (Colossians 1:22).

Core Bible Story Discussion

MARK 1:40-45 JESUS HEALS A MAN WITH LEPROSY

Read Mark 1:40. What was the man convinced that Jesus could do? Make him clean from leprosy.

How did the man show his faith in Jesus? He respectfully asked Jesus if He was willing and he believed Jesus could do it!

Read Mark 1:41. How did Jesus feel about what the man said? Jesus was filled with compassion for the man and cared for him.

What did Jesus say to him? "I am willing—be clean!" Jesus touched the man and said the words of healing.

Read Mark 1:42. Was the man healed? Yes—the leprosy left him immediately and he was cured.

Why do you think Jesus healed the man? The man showed his faith in Jesus. He believed Jesus was God's Son and had healing power.

Read Mark 1:43-45. What did Jesus do next? He gave the man a strong warning.

What did Jesus warn him not to do? He told the man not to tell anyone, but to quietly show the priest and give thanks to God.

Why did Jesus say this? He was humble about His power and wanted to avoid crowds that would hinder His ministry.

TEACHING OBJECTIVE

Teach the Core Bible Story to help students grasp the main idea.

TEACHING ACTIVITIES

1. Core Bible Story After sharing the story background from the Lesson Introduction, let students read the story and discuss the main idea.

2. Core Bible Story Discussion Have students read the specific verses and answer the questions. Discuss their answers.



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3. Word Search Students complete the Word Search activity.



We saw in the Core Bible Story that Jesus had the power to heal leprosy. The miracle was evidence that He was who He claimed to be: the Son of God descended from heaven (John 3:18, 13).

Philippians 2:6–8 tells us more about Jesus' divinity. It says that even though Jesus was "in very nature God," He came to earth and refused to "grasp" tightly to His "equality with God." Instead, He "made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness." When He took on "appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death—even death on a cross!"

In other words, Jesus was selfless and looked out for our interests, even though it cost Him dearly. He left His heavenly throne and came to earth, where He suffered and died to atone for our sins. We should have the same attitude as Jesus, not seeking to exalt ourselves, but instead looking out for others' interests.

To "love yourself" means to care for yourself and desire good for yourself; it doesn't mean that you like everything about yourself (in fact, the reason we don't like our noses and hair color is that we love ourselves and so want to look better). Loving ourselves means looking out for our own interests. Therefore, loving others means looking out for others' interests.

LESSON INTRODUCTION



Lesson Target

Know God's power in Jesus: the power to forgive sins and heal infirmities.

Lesson Setting

In this Core Bible Story, four friends carry their paralyzed friend to the roof, dig through the roof, and lower their friend on a mat to Jesus. Instead of healing the man, however, Jesus does something surprising: He says, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

The teachers of the law think this blasphemy, for only God can forgive sins. Jesus knows their thoughts and asks whether it's easier to say, "Your sins are forgiven," or "Get up, take your mat, and walk." It's easier to say the former, of course, because there is no way to prove it's so. But Jesus tells them, "But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins," and then He turns to the paralytic and tells him to get up, take his mat, and walk. The man does so.

Now the teachers are dumbfounded. If Jesus had blasphemed by claiming the authority to forgive sins, God wouldn't have allowed Him to heal the man. Yet He had.

Some of those present took the healing to be the sign that Jesus said it was: Jesus could forgive sins. Others, whose hearts were hard, refused to believe.

In the Core Bible Story, Jesus shows that He has the authority not only to heal, but to forgive sins. The people expected a Messiah who would restore Israel's kingdom on earth. But Jesus is here beginning to show He has a different mission, a mission having to do with healing bodies and forgiving sins.

Today we know what the people watching Jesus heal the paralytic didn't yet know: Jesus came to die on the cross in order to pay for people's sins so they could be with Him in the kingdom of God in resurrected bodies. That's why the Father sent Jesus.

Romans 8:32 says that God did not spare His Son, but gave Him up for us; therefore, we can expect God to graciously give us all things. In fact, there is nothing that can separate us from God's great love. The kingdom of God awaits. There we will have resurrected bodies free from all infirmities and diseases. There we will reign with Christ. There we will live in God's presence.



In the Core Bible Story, the effort the four friends went to in order to get their paralyzed friend to Jesus showed their faith in Jesus' power to heal. Our actions show our faith.

Hebrews 11 tells of a great many Old Testament heroes who showed faith in God and thereby saw God act mightily on their behalf. Verses 33b–34 speak of heroes who through faith did mighty deeds. Samson, David, and Daniel shut the mouths of lions. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego quenched the power of fire. Moses, Gideon, David, and many others escaped the edge of the sword. Samson, Gideon, and David became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies. Elijah called down fire from heaven to route armies and prove God alone is God.

All these died in faith, looking forward to the heavenly city, and not having yet seen all that was promised (verses 13, 39), for what was promised came through Jesus. The mighty deeds God did through the Old Testament saints were a foretaste of what God would do through Jesus. Jesus opened the way to the kingdom of God for those who live by faith.

These verses help us understand the victories of Hebrews 11 because they make it clear that even the weakness of God is stronger than man's strength. God's power is made perfect in our own weaknesses!

Challenge: What did the Old Testament heroes have in common with Jesus? Hebrews 11:33b-34 and the related verses above remind us that the Old Testament heroes who lived before Jesus lived had victory over their enemies because of their faith in God. Today, our faith in God gives us victory over sin when we believe that He sent His Son to die for us and give us eternal life. The Old Testament heroes gave us a preview of the ultimate hero: Jesus, the Son of God and Savior of the world!

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



Mark 3:1–6

Background

Lesson Target

Know God's love through Jesus: God loves the world so much that He gave His Son so we could be saved by faith in Jesus.

Lesson Setting

Because the nations of Israel and Judah abandoned God, God abandoned them in 586 BC and sent the people into exile for seventy years (Jeremiah 12:7; 25:11). Although He allowed the people to return to the land, they remained under foreign rule. The previous kings held the title "anointed one"—or "messiah"—and the prophets said to expect a new "anointed one" to rule them as king.

He was a long time in coming, however. By the time of Jesus, over five hundred years had passed and several religious sects had arisen with different beliefs about a coming messiah. None of them turned out to be completely right. The **Sadducees** consisted of the priestly aristocracy and neither expected nor wanted a messiah: they didn't want to lose their political power and religious position. The **Herodians** backed the current Palestinian dynasty and didn't want a messianic king disrupting their political goals. The **Zealots** awaited a warrior messiah who would deliver them from Rome; they told other Jews to reject Roman rule so the messiah could arise.

But it was the **Pharisees'** beliefs that conflicted most with Jesus' teaching. They believed God was waiting until the people were holy enough to deserve a messiah. They reasoned that since God had taken away their kingdom because they had rejected His laws, then He would restore their kingdom when they embraced His laws well enough. They created a system of oral traditions meant to be a hedge around God's laws, including many rules about what could and couldn't be done on the Sabbath to avoid breaking the Fourth Commandment: "Observe the Sabbath day, to keep it holy" (Deuteronomy 5:12). Most Jews honored and respected the Pharisees as holy people. They accepted the Pharisees' claim that they were authorities on Old Testament laws even though they were not of the priesthood God set up.

Jesus, however, rejected the Pharisees' rules as mere "traditions of men," not commands of God (Mark 7:7–9). The Pharisees demanded Jesus stop healing on the Sabbath because of their rule that one could heal on the Sabbath only to save a life. In the Core Bible Story, Jesus has a man with a shriveled hand stand up in the synagogue and then He tries to reason with the Pharisees. He asks, "Which is lawful on the Sabbath, to do good or to do evil, to save life or to kill?" The Pharisees refuse to answer.

Jesus heals the man, which was a sign that He was not only from God, but was right to reject the Pharisees' traditions. They were furious, however, and together with some Herodians sought to kill Jesus. Thus Jesus' question, "is it lawful to save life or kill?" takes on special meaning: On the Sabbath, they plot to kill.

In the Core Bible Story, Jesus healed a man with a shriveled hand on a Sabbath, despite the Pharisees' demand that He desist. In so doing, Jesus showed that He had come to bring love and healing, not to submit to a religious sect's teaching of what holiness meant. The Pharisees wanted a messiah who would be a king submissive to them; Jesus rejected their authority. His power to heal showed God had sent Him, but most of the Pharisees refused to believe a person who rejected their rules could be from God.

One Pharisee who listened to Jesus was Nicodemus. Jesus told Nicodemus that the Pharisees had it wrong: God hadn't sent Him to condemn the world, but to save it. He said, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). God wasn't waiting until the people were good enough to deserve a messiah; He sent the Messiah to make sinful people good.

Jesus told Nicodemus about the kingdom of God. He was beginning to make known that His kingdom wasn't of this world, like the Pharisees expected (John 18:36). No, Jesus' kingdom is the kingdom of heaven.





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This Unit's Connection

Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

In the Core Bible Story, the Pharisees try to make Jesus submit to their rules. They believe doing so makes a person good. They're blind to the fact that healing is good, and therefore their rules actually forbade doing good. When Jesus argues along this line, they can't answer Him and angrily remain silent. When He heals the man, they plot to kill Him, blind to their own evil on the Sabbath.

The Pharisees thought obeying their rules would make people good. Jesus pointed out time and again that their thoughts and attitudes were evil: Their rules hadn't made them good or prevented evil in their hearts. He taught the people that "unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 5:20). They simply weren't good enough. Trying to cover up sin in one's body with good deeds is no more effective than trying to cover up termites in a fence with fresh paint; both hide rather than cure the core trouble.

All of us have sinned in our thoughts, attitudes, and actions. Sin brings the wage of death. Following a set of rules can't reverse that. Jesus came to die and pay for our sins. Those who have faith in Him are washed clean from their sins. Ephesians 2:8–9 says, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God not by works, so that no one can boast."

Ephesians 2:8–9 and the related verses above clearly teach us this: We cannot save ourselves so that no one can boast. We should be proud to know that eternal life is a gift that only God can give!







Know God's assurance through Jesus: just as the disciples called upon Jesus in the midst of their fear, He wants us to call on Him when we are fearful so that He can show His power to us and others.

Lesson Setting

In this Core Bible Story, Jesus tells His disciples that He desires to go to the other side of the Sea of Galilee. We read that the disciples "took him along, just as he was." His desire to get away from the crowd was so great that they did not wait to get extra cloaks, pack food, or send messengers. He said the word and, as faithful followers, they obeyed. Jesus was tired and peacefully slept as the storm raged, but the lack of faith in Jesus' words ("Let us go to the other side") and in His power (previous miracles that they had no doubt heard about and even seen) produced fear in the disciples.

The word "rebuked," which is used to describe how Jesus spoke to the wind and rain, is the same word used when He silenced demons. This indicates that the storm was probably a spiritual battle as much as a weather crisis. Note: Mark is the only Gospel that records Jesus' words to the storm.

The calming of the sea does not produce calm in the disciples. They become terrified as they see the true power of the Man (also God) they are following.

Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

In the Core Bible Story, the disciples' boat is nearly swamped in a powerful storm. They awaken Jesus and ask, "Don't you care if we drown?" He rebukes the wind and tells the waves to be still and they calm! The disciples are terrified at Jesus' power. They realize He is like no other man.

King David knew of God's mighty power to save. In Psalm 139:9–10, he says that there is no place we can go that will render us out of God's reach. We can take comfort in the knowledge that the Jesus who calmed the sea is the Jesus who cares for us now.

In this world, we will have troubles, just as Jesus did. At times, Jesus will use His mighty power to rescue us from them, as He did when He calmed the storm that frightened the disciples. At other times, He will be with us as we go through troubles, as He was when angry Jews stoned Stephen (Acts 7:55). Jesus tells us, "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

And so He has. When the end of our time on earth draws near, Jesus will bring us to the Father. "By his power God raised the Lord from the dead, and he will raise us also" (1 Corinthians 6:14). He will bring us to His Kingdom to reign with Him forever more.





Jesus commanded us to preach the good news to all creation because He made it clear that whoever believes will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned. Acts 1:8 and the related verses above show us that our highest call is to be His witnesses. To do so, He equips us with the power of the Holy Spirit and promises the grace of God on those who spread the word.

LESSON INTRODUCTION



Mark 5:22-42

Background

Lesson Target

Know God's salvation through Jesus: Jesus has power over sickness and death.

Lesson Setting

Mark dedicates much of his Gospel writings to the miracles of Jesus. We have seen His power over demons and nature, and now, in this passage, over sickness and death. The woman's disease would have caused her to be an outcast in society. Anyone coming in physical contact with her would have been considered unclean. In fact, the opposite was true as it was her contact with Christ that cleansed her. More importantly, Jesus announces that it was her faith that healed her, not just the fact that she came into physical contact with Jesus. The crowd was "pressed around" Jesus and many were touching Him, but only the woman was healed. In the entire crowd, she was the only one who touched Him with the desire, expectation and faith that He could change her life.

Jairus called upon Jesus to heal his daughter, but in the time that it took to heal the woman, his daughter died. Jesus tells Jairus to "only believe," so Jairus could do nothing but hang on to Jesus and His words to not be afraid and to believe.

Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

In the Core Bible Story, Jesus did two miracles. First, He healed a woman who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years. She had been unable to participate in temple worship, and she had spent all her money on physicians who couldn't heal her. She touched Jesus' cloak and was immediately healed. Afterwards, Jesus raised a little girl from the dead.

These two miracles were signs that God sent Jesus and that Jesus fulfilled many prophecies. They showed that Jesus could heal diseases and raise the dead. Those signs would have been enough for anyone seeking God wholeheartedly.

But many rejected Jesus. Matthew 12:38–41 says this:

Then some of the Pharisees and teachers of the law said to him, "Teacher, we want to see a miraculous sign from you."

He answered, "A wicked and adulterous generation asks for a miraculous sign! But none will be given it except the sign of the prophet Jonah. For as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of a huge fish, so the Son of Man will be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth. The men of Nineveh will stand up at the judgment with this generation and condemn it; for they repented at the preaching of Jonah, and now one greater than Jonah is here."

Those who didn't want to believe demanded more and more signs. But Jesus refused: The only sign they would have was His resurrection. Just as the prophet Jonah spent three days in the belly of a huge fish, so He would spend three days in the belly of the earth. Jesus warned them that at the Judgment the people of Nineveh would condemn them, for the Ninevites repented when the only sign they had was Jonah's preaching. These religious leaders had many greater signs and yet they refused to repent. At the Judgment, they could not argue that they hadn't enough evidence to believe. They needed to turn away from their sin and pride, just like Jonah and the Ninevites did.







Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

In the Core Bible Story, Jesus showed He had power over sickness and death. Still, the Pharisees refused to believe that God sent Him. They clung to their theology that following their traditions made them good people—good enough for God to receive them. They didn't believe they needed God's forgiveness, so they wouldn't turn to the Man who says they did.

In John 14:6, Jesus says, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." The Pharisees thought they could come to the Father by their own goodness based on their own rules. They didn't want to believe they weren't as good as they thought they were.

This same attitude prevails in America today. Most Americans think they are good people and if there is a God, they'll go to heaven based on their goodness. But the Bible teaches that all of us have sinned and deserve death, not eternal life (Romans 3:23; 6:23). The only way to God is to admit our sins, turn from them, and turn to faith in Jesus who paid for our sins.

How do these verses help us understand John 14:6?

These verses help us understand Jesus as the way, the truth, and the life because they describe the Way of Holiness, the truth about believing in Jesus and never dying, and the life of Jesus appearing to bring us eternal life.

Challenge: Which verses above describe Jesus as the "way"? Which describe Jesus as the "life"?

Jesus is described as the "way" in Isaiah 35:8. He is called the "Way of Holiness" and the highway to God, which is only for those who walk in His way. Jesus is described as the "life" in both John 11:25–26 and in 1 John 1:2. In John 11 Jesus calls Himself the "resurrection and the life" and promises eternal life to those who believe. In 1 John Jesus is the "life" that appeared to us to bring us eternal life.



LESSON INTRODUCTION



Mark 5:22–42

Background

Lesson Target

Know God's reward through faith in Jesus: God rewards those who seek Him and He increases their faith.

Lesson Setting

In the Core Bible Story, we continue to see Jesus as the God-man as He shows His power while serving people's needs. IIn Mark 6:35, Jesus attempted to get away to a quiet place, but the crowds found Him. Rather than seeing the people as a frustration (even though Mark 6:30–34 describes tired and hungry disciples), Jesus sees them as sheep without a shepherd and tends to their needs. He begins with teaching and then feeds the 5,000 by multiplying five loaves of bread and two fish.

Jesus then sends the disciples away on the boat. Before joining the disciples, Jesus heads up to the hillside above the Sea of Galilee. His day of teaching and feeding ends in time alone between Him and His Father. While on the hill, He sees the disciples straining at the oars against rough waters. Jesus walks on water to join them. In Matthew 14:28–31, we see more details of the story as Peter gets out of the boat and walks to Jesus.

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This Unit's Connection

Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

Meditating upon the Core Bible Story teaches us many things. We learn of Jesus' compassion, and that reminds us to train ourselves to be more compassionate. We read of Jesus' power, and that emboldens us to put our full faith in Him. We see that Jesus' teaching is just as important to us as physical food, and that encourages us to spend more time in Scripture. We grasp that if Jesus considered prayer essential for Himself, even more so must it be for us. We see an example of how when we put God first, God takes care of everything else, and that inspires us to make time with God a priority, trusting God to handle the rest. The many lessons we can learn from this story are a good example of what 1 Timothy 4 teaches. It tells us to devote ourselves to Scripture so that we can be an example in speech, life, love, faith, and purity. Verses 7–8 tells us to ignore godless myths and train ourselves to be godly, for godliness brings value for both this life and life in the kingdom of God. By meditating deeply on passages such as the core Bible story, and by training ourselves to do what we learn from these passages, we grow in godliness.



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

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This Unit's Connection

Core Bible Story & Bible Passage

In the Core Bible Story, when Jesus instructs the disciples to have the people sit and to bring Him the loaves and fish, they have faith to obey. When He sends them off in the boat, they again obey. Their obedience is rewarded by seeing great displays of God's power: the miraculous multiplying of food and Jesus walking on water. The disciples believe God sent Jesus and that God will reward them for seeking Him through Jesus.

Hebrews 11:6 says that it's impossible to please God without faith. At the minimum, we must believe that God exists and that He'll reward us if we earnestly seek Him. We seek God in Scripture when we meditate on Scripture to find out what God is like and how to please Him. We seek God in prayer when we spend time alone with God, like Jesus did. We seek God in faith when we obey Him, despite what we may feel like doing. The only way we can truly and consistently seek God in these three ways is if we believe He'll reward us for doing so.

In fact, if we're not seeking God consistently in these ways, it may be a sign of weak faith—of not really believing God will reward us. But we can strengthen our faith by seeking God and asking Him to grow our faith. When we do, He'll reward us!





- 2) A large crowd followed Jesus and pressed around him. A sick woman came up to Jesus and thought that if she just (touched) his clothes then she would be healed.
- 3) Immediately after touching his clothes, she was (healed). Jesus felt power go out of him and asked, "Who touched my clothes?"
- 4) The woman fell at Jesus feet and told him the whole truth. Jesus said to her, "Daughter, your (faith) has healed you. Go in peace and be freed from your suffering."
- 5) The men told Jairus, "Your daughter is (dead)."
- 6) Jesus told Jairus, "Don't be afraid; just (believe).
- 7) People in front of the house were (crying) and wailing loudly.
- Jesus tells them that the child is not (dead) but asleep. The people respond by (laughing) at Jesus.
- Jesus commands the little girl to get up. Immediately the girl stood up and (walked) around.
- 10) The people were completely (astonished).

Next, tell the students that you will share background information about the story and that they will need to listen and identify at least two new things they didn't previously know. The teacher will read the Lesson Setting and This Week's Connection on pp. 82 and 83 to the students. Ask students to share their new insights from the story.

Responses will vary.





Jonah 3:1-3a

Ask a student to read the Bible Passage from page 68 and then close their workbook. Discuss: What is the main idea of the passage? God used Jonah to bring His message to the great city of Nineveh.

Choose one student to recite the passage from memory (may get help from classmates).

-or-

Students partner up and quiz each other on the passage. After a few minutes, choose one student to recite the passage to the class from memory.

Then the word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time: "Go to the great city of Nineveh and proclaim to it the message I give you." Jonah obeyed the word of the Lord and went to Nineveh.

Choose 8 students to read in chronological order the steps of the timeline on page 70 of the Student Workbook before listening to the song.

While listening to the song, students write down their insights and make personal connections on the lyrics page (circle key words, underline action steps, write out what God is teaching them to do, rewrite main ideas in their own words, etc.).

Discuss: What can we learn from the story of Jonah and the song "You Can't Run"

You can't run from God. When God is calling you to do something, you should do it. Not obeying God will lead you to some dark places. Sometimes you may need to throw away your sin and pride and simply obey God. When you obey and follow what the Lord is leading you to do, then you will be blessed.

Motto

Jonah obeyed the Word of the Lord

Application: Compare what happened when Jonah tried to run from God vs. when Jonah finally obeys the Word of the Lord.

Disobedience leads to destruction. Obedience leads to blessing.

God sends Jonah to Nineveh to tell the people to repent and turn from their wicked ways. Jonah doesn't want to deliver the message, so he decides not to obey God. God sends a storm and Jonah gets swallowed by a giant fish. Jonah realizes he was wrong and asks God to save him from the fish.

God gives Jonah a second chance to obey. When Jonah finally obeys God, good things happened. Jonah warns the people of Nineveh that if they don't repent, then God will destroy them. The people believe the message and ask God to forgive them.



John 14:6

Ask a student to read the Bible Passage from page 75 and then close their workbook.

Discuss: What is the main idea of the passage? Jesus is the only way to eternal life in heaven with God.

Choose one student to recite the passage from memory (may get help from classmates).

-or-

Students partner up and quiz each other on the passage. After a few minutes, choose one student to recite the passage to the class from memory.

Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

Jesus is the only way to eternal life in heaven with God.

I am the way and the truth and the life

Application: Jesus is described as three things: the way, the truth, and the life. What does each of these things mean?

The Way – The Way of Holiness and the highway to God, which is only for those who walk in His way.

The Truth – Jesus is truth personified. He gives the world its meaning. His truth is absolute and unchanging, and is the truth that everyone should seek and believe.

The Life – Jesus promises eternal life to those who believe. Jesus is the "life" that appeared to us to bring us eternal life.

Read Mark 6:35 44— Jesus Feeds 5,000 and Walks on Water

Begin by reading the Core Bible Story. Next, ask one student or entire class to briefly summarize the Jesus Feeds 5,000 in four main parts and Jesus Walks on Water in four main parts. Teacher writes responses on the board to facilitate discussion.

Jesus Feeds 5,000

- 1) Disciples want to send the people away to get their own food, but Jesus wants the disciples to give them something to eat.
- 2) Jesus tells the disciples to gather what they have (5 loaves and 2 fish) and have the people sit in groups.
- Jesus looked to heaven, gave thanks, and divided the loaves. He gave them to the disciples to serve to the people.
- 4) 5,000 ate and were satisfied. There were twelve basketfuls of broken pieces of bread and fish left over.

Jesus Walks on Water

- 1) Disciples get into boat while Jesus leaves to pray
- 2) The wind is strong and disciples strain at the oars.
- 3) Jesus walks on water...disciples are terrified
- 4) Jesus tells them not to be afraid...disciples are amazed

What do these two miracles tell us about Jesus?

Jesus is powerful and can do miracles; we should put our full faith in Him. Jesus is compassionate and cares about our needs. Jesus spent time alone with His father. This reminds us how when we put God first, God takes care of everything else and that inspires us to make time with God a priority, trusting God to handle the rest.

1 Timothy 4:7-8

Ask a student to read the Bible Passage from page 84 and then close their workbook. Discuss: What is the main idea of the passage?

Don't pay attention to godless ideas. Instead, train to be godly to be blessed in this life and the life to come.

Choose one student to recite the passage from memory (may get help from classmates).

-or-

Students partner up and quiz each other on the passage. After a few minutes, choose one student to recite the passage to the class from memory.

Have nothing to do with godless myths and old wives' tales; rather; train yourself to be godly. For physical training is of some value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come.
